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



BRING IN A BRIGHT ORANGE SOFA

ED A-List designer Lorenzo Castillo created a warm and welcoming space in this Paris family room. The custom sofa is upholstered in autumnal orange and paired with a stool by Marc Bankowsky.



ADD JEWEL-TONE ACCESSORIES

In this Manhattan apartment designed by ED A-List designer David Kleinberg, a sapphire blue chair is paired with a Paul Frankl desk from 1st Dibs. A luxe cashmere throw adds color to an ottoman while velvet throw pillows add texture to the sofa.





DON'T IGNORE RUST- PAINTED FURNITURE

Painting walls for a season may seem daunting but sprucing up a small piece of furniture can also have a major impact. Designer Rodney Lawrence made a sophisticated statement with matching twin beds in this Quogue, NY children's bedroom.



**HANG AN OVERSIZE
PAINTING IN EARTH
TONES**

Varying shades of brown are used in this New York study. A large painting by Jonathan Meese compliments matching wingback chairs in similar earth tones.



PAINT THE INSIDE OF THE BOOKCASE

An orange interior gives off a warm glow in the bookcase. ED A-List designer Jeffrey Bilhuber weaves orange hues throughout the composition of this Jackson Hole study creating a cozy space.



LAYER IN SATURATE TEXTILES

A luxe orange throw is draped over white bedding. An antique Japanese obi was used to create banded details on the master bed in this Manhattan apartment.



WEAVE IN YELLOW ACCESSORIES

Yellow accessories and accent furniture bring fall vibes to this kitchen. The wood floor and cabinets are a warm contrast to the custom white quartzite countertop in this New Jersey home.



ADD A TEXTURED RUG TO A DINING AREA

Ali Wentworth and George Stephanopolous know the key to an inviting dining room: a statement rug. The actress and her news-anchor husband chose a striking zebra print rug for the dining space in their colorful D.C. home. RJones chairs, an antique dining table from Liza Sherman Antiques, and a Juju hat purchased at a flea market complete the look.





HANG PLAID CURTAINS

If you're partial to plaid, try curtains boasting the classic, fall-appropriate pattern. This living room, plaid curtains of a fabric by Brochier complement striped Arte wallpaper, which is hung horizontally.

MIX PATTERNED THROW PILLOWS

Fall is all about making a room feel more cozy, and throw pillows are perfect for adding warmth to a space. In the living room in Chad Stark's East Village apartment, Scalamandré armchairs and ottomans are upholstered in fabrics by Jean-Paul Gaultier for Lelievre, the cocktail table is by Vladimir Kagan, and the rug is by STARK.



WEAVE IN ANTIQUES

Antiques, like this secretary's desk in the Tribeca loft of Homepolish designer Jae Joo, never fail to add depth to a room. The unique piece enhances the room and serves as a nice balance to the white walls.





EMBRACE NATURE

Embrace the beauty of the fall season by choosing understated furnishings and a subdued color palette that keep the focus on the outdoor view. In this Tahoe bedroom crafted by designer Jamie Bush and architect Cynthia Wang, floor-to-ceiling windows steal the show.



GO FOR BURNT ORANGE WALLS

A collection of art stands out against burnt orange walls in Antonello Radi's 16th-century Umbrian home. Antique mirrors, along with orange velvet chairs, lend a vintage flair to the space, which is complete with a 19th-century mantel.



EMBRACE WOOD PANELING

An 18th-century farm estate in the Hudson Valley features a library with antique Tennessee pine panels. To complement the wood paneled walls, a George Smith chair is draped in a C&C Milano linen and textiles from Pakistan, India, Indonesia, and Italy, and an antique Italian bench is covered in a 16th-century tapestry fragment. The bookcase light is by Ann-Morris, and the 1929 pastel portrait is French.

LAYER ACCESSORIES

While brick walls tend to feel cold, layers of rugs, throws and pillows, along with warm woods, make this living room design by Homepolish's Becky Shea feel cozy.





MATCH WOODS TO FURNITURE

In the São Miguel home of architect Luís Bernardo Brito e Abreu, caramel-colored 1960s chairs by Daciano da Costa complement the tones of the pine doors and oak dining table. The armoire is 18th-century Indo-Portuguese, the ceiling is Japanese cedar, and the flooring is local basalt.

TRY FLORAL WALLPAPER

Along with upholstered seating, floral wallpaper in a fall-appropriate green hue add personality to the grand salon of the Sonoma Valley lake house designed by Ken Fulk with the architect Ken Linsteadt. The vintage Edward Wormley sofa for Dunbar is in a JAB Anstoetz fabric, the Casamidy barstools have seats in a Dedar weave, and the dining table is from the Brimfield Antique Show. The custom chandeliers are by One Off Furniture, and the floral wallcovering is by Schumacher.





TRY OVERSIZED FURNITURE IN DEEP TONES

For a family room in a Tribeca loft, a large, custom sectional is covered in deep grey Great Plains and Donghia fabrics, which add warmth to the space. The cocktail table by Daniel Scuderi and the chandelier by Trans-Luxe are both custom, the Ecart International sconces are from Ralph Pucci, the curtains are of a Stark fabric, and the carpet is by Tai Ping; the walls are in a Dualoy leather, the ceiling is painted in Benjamin Moore's Bison Brown, and the artwork is by Zipora Fried.



MIX NEUTRALS

A ranch house in Upstate New York designed by Ernest de la Torre features a mix of neutral tones for a cozy vibe. The family room's Jean-Michel Frank sofa is by Ecart Paris, the wooden chair carved in the style of Pedro Friedeberg came from a Paris flea market .



**ADD A POP OF
BURNT ORANGE
AGAINST DARK
WOOD**

Architects Lance and Nicola Herbst ingeniously tucked their spacious weekend retreat amid a lush grove of exotic trees. In the living area of the house, designed in its entirety by the couple, the burnt orange sofa is a custom design, and the fireplace by Masport Heating is set in a custom-made steel cabinet.

BRING THE OUTDOORS IN WITH A STACK OF FIREWOOD

A barn doubles as a guest house on the property of Amanda Seyfried's weekend retreat in the Catskills. In the living area, an original wood-burning stove is backed by a wall of custom concrete tiles. The chair is vintage.

USE THE FIREPLACE TO AESTHETICALLY WARM THE ROOM

Out in the English countryside, this 17th-century estate provides a cozy getaway year-round, but it is particularly welcoming in the fall. The stair hall features a hand-carved mantel above the glowing fireplace, and the armchairs are 19th-century Italian.



LAYER UP WITH A WARM BLANKET

Soft, neutral hues interact to create serene and comfortable sleeping quarters in this Manhattan apartment designed by Robert Couturier. The room's walls are covered in a velvet by Sahco and the lamps are by Mauro Fabbro.



DON'T SHY AWAY FROM DARK BROWN LEATHER

Hollywood honcho Brett Ratner created a cozy sitting area off his living room of his Beverly Hills house, using handsome leather club chairs and minimal pops of color.



INCORPORATE FOREST ELEMENTS

A forest-inspired mural enlivens the powder room of a California retreat updated by decorator Madeline Stuart. The mural is by Jean Horchata, the circa-1890 Tramp Art mirror is American and the stool is Chinese.



WEAVE IN RED-ORANGE HUES

Old world charm abounds in the dining room of Gérard Tremolet's 11th-century château in Normandy, France, with orange-red hues and an unassuming wood table evocative of autumn woods.



HANG LIGHTS FOR A SUBTLE GLOW

At William Abranowicz and Andrea Raisfeld's home in Bedford, New York, a rustic screened porch doubles as a bedroom. The collection of transferware plates was purchased at yard sales, the bedding is by John Robshaw and the rocker is by Harry Bertoia. The walls are stained cedar.



TRY BLACK WALLS AND BROWN LEATHER FOR AN UNSUSPECTING MATCH

A 1970s leather sofa and matching chairs punctuate 1stdibs founder Michael Bruno's moody sitting room in his Tuxedo Park house. The marble top of the cocktail table came from a Belgium chocolate factor and the camel sculptures were bought on 1stdibs. The walls are painted in Benjamin Moore's Dragon's Breath.



BRANDING

SWNA designed the toothpaste of Dr.NOAH, a natural oral care brand created by a dentist. To express toothpaste made of natural or nature-derived ingredients without unnecessary, 'a firm dentist's chart that seems to have confidently removed the bad ingredients' became a motif for the team.

Dr.NOAH's philosophy of considering healthy toothpaste and sustainability was expressed in restrained and unique graphic design using mint, white, and black as the main colors. The ingredients that should be written on the back of the tube was confidently revealed on the front, and the excluded ingredients were erased by markers. The toothpaste comes in two different purposes - with or without fluorine.


